Fun was had by one and all - we hope to see you at the next Lappie Walk and Picnic!



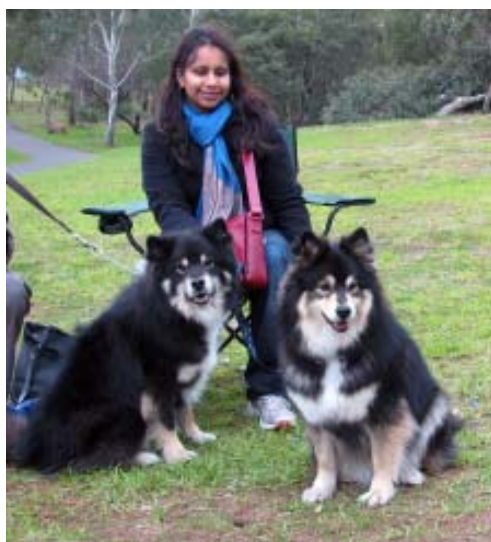

Official 'Good' News

The FLCV Breeding Program and Code of Ethics is a direct response the Code of Practice, and provides breeding guidelines for hereditary conditions in the Finnish Lapphund Breed.

You can see a copy of the Breeding Program on our web site in the Club Rules section. More information will be provided in our next newsletter about the Breeding Program and its review in 2010.

The Code of Practice for the Responsible Breeding of Animals with Heritable Defects that cause Disease was gazetted on the 18 June 2009 and is now in effect.

The code is made under Section 7 of the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act.

The code outlines breeding practices that will assist in reducing the prevalence of heritable defects in animal populations, especially those diseases regulated by the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act.

The code was developed in consultation with a working group of stakeholders with expertise in animal welfare, animal genetics, veterinary science, commercial breeding and genetic testing. It aims to educate animal breeders on how to minimise or avoid breeding heritable defects in animals.

Pet Profile

Helen's Adventures with Jaari & Leisel

Jaari is a great big beautiful gentle sook of a dog. Shy and introverted, he is happiest spending his time quietly at home. Right now he is sleeping under my desk, with his head on my feet. No one has ever explained to Jaari that he looks like a cross between a bear and a wolf, so in his mind he is a very small dog who needs protecting from the world.

Ideally Jaari would like to be carried around in my bag, Hollywood starlet style, so he could just duck and hide if anything scary were to happen.

He doesn't like strange people, and all most visitors see is a black flash fleeing, or maybe some eyes peering at them from under the bed. But once Jaari trusts you and has decided that your hobbies don't include beating dogs with sticks, you get to know a very affectionate, funny, loyal, happy dog.

When Jaari wants attention he gives you The Paw. This involves him sitting in front of you and gently putting one of his front paws on you and looking at you with big eyes until you scratch his belly or ears. He does this not only to people, but to other dogs, and occasionally even the cat. The cat and Jaari have always got along well, because unlike Leisel, Jaari understands the cat is a superior being who must be respected and feared and obeyed at all times.

Having a giant furry paw plonked on his head causes the cat to give Jaari a very withering look though. Jaari has a distinct stubborn streak, but rarely misbehaves. Food left in reach will be left alone, though I once caught him ever so gently removing one single chip from an entire box of fish and chips, and running off with it in glee.

He also goes rather silly at times, and runs laps of the garden at high speed, or grabs a toy and races about inside, skidding around the couch and leaping over the bed, with Leisel in hot pursuit and the cat glaring and plotting the death of both of them. 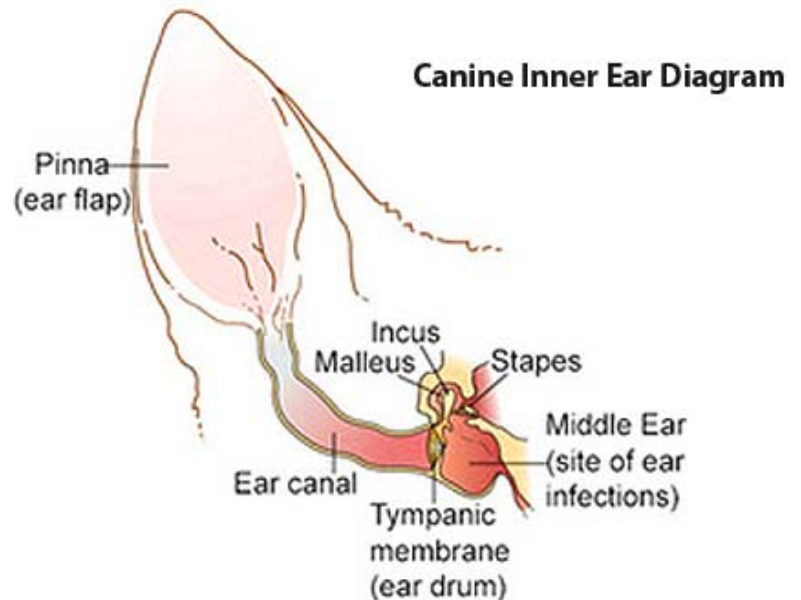

Canine Health

Care For Ears

Most people know that dogs have very sensitive hearing, and can detect a much wider range of sounds than humans.

In the wild, dogs and wolves depend on their hearing for survival, while at home this ability is vital for a dog to be fully aware of what is happening in his environment.



Ensuring the right ear care for your dog.

It is important that in order to have a happy and healthy dog that you maintain your dog's ear care. Ensuring that your dog's ears are clean and checking on the condition of your dog's regularly will go a long way towards preventing an ear infection.

Some breeds of dog are more prone to ear health problems than others. Dogs with floppy ears, or a lot of fur around their ears, can be more prone to infections and mites. Although not common in lappies, infections can and do occur, so it's important to have an established ear care routine.

Common Dog Ear Health Problems:

Ear infections can be caused by parasitic infestations as well as microbial infections (such as yeast infections) and bacteria. If your dog's ears become infested with parasites, such as ear mites, there will be some telltale signs. Your dog will shake his head and scratch his ears excessively. Ear mites and other parasites also often leave black, gritty residue inside the ear.

If your dog develops a microbial or a bacterial infection of the ear, you'll notice your dog shaking and scratching, even trying to rub his head along the ground. Yeast infections are also accompanied by a foul odour, and if left untreated, bacterial infections can develop, resulting in extreme inflammation and fluid build up within his ears.

Such conditions are very painful, and if left untreated can lead to hearing loss or even deafness. If you suspect an ear infection you should seek veterinary advice as soon as possible

Examine Your Dog's Ears:

Examining your dog's ears at home is very, very easy, and should be included as part of your regular grooming routine. Check for redness, wax build-up, and foreign matter inside your dog's ears. Also check to see if there are foul odours coming from the ear, which may indicate an ear problem.

Clean your dog's ears after bathing and swimming as well. Keep your dog's ears dry and NEVER use a cotton swab in your dog's ear as this could result in pain and even injury.

Get Prompt Treatment

We all want to ensure that our dogs are happy and healthy, and, as with most things, the proverbial ounce of prevention is always far better than a pound of cure.

Prompt treatment for ear infestations is vital - fortunately, treatment of these infestations is usually straightforward and simple.

Like humans, if your dog enjoys swimming in the summer months, he or she may be susceptible to the canine version of 'swimmers ear'. Use an ear cleaner recommended by your vet; it will contain ingredients that help balance the pH inside your dog's ears to prevent yeast infection.

Want to see a number of Lappies in one place, all looking their best? Well if you are planning on heading to The Royal Melbourne Show with your family this year, why not aim for Saturday 19 September. That is the day Finnish Lapphund breed judging will be held.

Some of the Lappies you know and love, and others you have probably never seen before, will be strutting their stuff around the ring at 10am on that day. Come along and cheer for your favourites, take some photos, and give a big round of applause for the Best of Breed winner.

If you are there on the day, find us in the Dog Pavillion and we can tell you which ring we will be in, so you can take a break from rides and show-bag shopping to celebrate our beautiful breed - we'll be there all day to say hello even if you miss us in the show ring.

International Lappie News

Finnish Specialty

FLCV President: I received an excited email from my friend Johanna, in Finland the other day. She had just returned from the Lapphund summer specialty show, where there were 89 Finnish Lapphunds in the ring.

For those of you who don't know, in Finland there are three Lapphund breeds, and their specialty shows consist of all of them: the Finnish Lapphund, the Swedish Lapphund, and the Lapponian Herder (a breed we don't have here in Australia).

Each breed competes for Best of Breed, Best Opposite Sex of Breed, Best Puppy of Breed, Best Opposite Sex Puppy of Breed, Best Veteran of Breed, Best Opposite Sex Veteran of Breed. Then the three winning Best of Breeds compete for Best in Show 1, 2 and 3.

Johanna's excitement came because at this particular show, her male Finnish Lapphund Eppu (Fin & Int Ch Lumiturpa Eppu) had been awarded Best in Show 1. But that wasn't enough. Her female Lapponian Herder Taika (Fin Ch Lumiturpa Taikatalvi) had been awarded Best in Show 2, her female Finnish Lapphund Mimmi (Fin Ch Lumiturpa Kylmankukka) had been awarded Best Opposite Sex Veteran of Breed, and her young male Finnish Lapphund puppy Aija (Lumiturpa Aija) had been awarded Best Opposite Sex Puppy of Breed! What a show!

USA Specialty & AKC Debut

Across in the USA, they have recently also held their national specialty show. This show was particularly significant this year, as it was held on the 3 July, at the commencement of the first weekend the Finnish Lapphund breed debuted into the American Kennel Club's miscellaneous class.

Breed recognition in the AKC is a very long and arduous task, with the breeders and exhibitors having been working toward it for decades now! Moving into the miscellaneous class is the second last step for the Finnish Lapphund Club of America prior to full recognition, and a momentous occasion for all of us around the world. I have heard from a number of my American friends, since, and it appears they are enjoying being active in the AKC ring promoting our beautiful breed over the last few weekends.

Their specialty, although not judged by a breed specialist this year, was well attended by over 20 Lapphunds, and I believe a wonderful time was held by all.

Main results are as follows:

Best of Breed: Yutori's Shades of Autumn

Best of Opposite Sex: Ferndale's California Girl

Best in Sweepstakes (puppies and junior dogs):
Snowyriver Stars and Stripes

A specialty, or specialty show, refers to a conformation show which is for a particular breed. These will generally be run and organised by a breed club. So the specialty in Finland, for example, is run by the Lapphund Club of Finland, and the one in the USA by the Finnish Lapphund Club of America.

These are prestigious events, where there is usually a great entry from across the country, and winning at such a show is considered the goal of many.

Although not always the case, most times the breed club will attempt to appoint a "specialist" judge for the show – this is a judge who has particular experience with the breed in question and is considered an "expert".

The FLCV looks forward to the day it is ready to hold its first specialty in Victoria.

Yarra Bend Park (Fairfield) – Sunday 13 September 2009

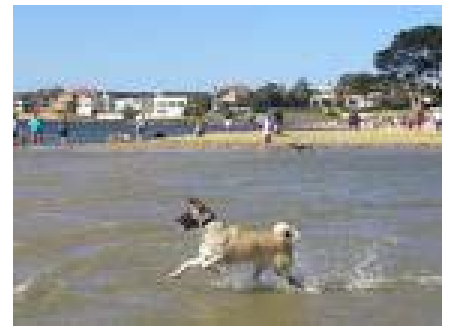

This reserve is a great place for dog walking as the area is quite large and the walking tracks follow the river through most of the park



Sandown Street Beach / Brighton Beach – Saturday 5 December 2009

Note: we will meet and picnic at the foreshore nearest the yacht club / pier / baths and then walk along the new esplanade to this beach for some off-lead (for those that want it) and then back to the picnic area for lunch

About The Beach: Sandown Street Beach has a fully fenced off leash dog area between Bay Street and Sandown Street. This dog beach is for use all year round with no time or day restrictions. The beach has fantastic views across Port Phillip Bay and is close to public transport and the trendy suburb of Brighton. This beach is a relativley protected from the weather but is quite busy with boats and people during the summer months.



Royal Botanical Gardens (Melbourne) – Saturday 14 March 2010

About The Gardens: The Royal Botanical Gardens Melbourne is an on leash dog area that is located off Birdwood Avenue in South Yarra. The gardens are open daily from 7.30am to 8.30pm (November to March) and 7.30am to 5.30pm (April to October). The gardens have walking tracks, city views, cafes and a fantastic array of bird life that have made the gardens their home. The Royal Botanical Gardens Melbourne is one of Melbourne's top dog walking areas.

Sheep Herding Clinic / Fun Day

Most of you would be aware that the Finnish Lapphund breed is a dog bred for herding reindeer. Of course, reindeer aren't too readily available here in Australia! So for those of us who would like to give our Lappies the opportunity to use their instincts, we usually have to make do with sheep.

Herding is a great fun sport, which most dogs absolutely love! Dogs Victoria (as part of the ANKC) sanctions herding tests and trials on a regular basis for breeds that are suitable for herding.

There are a few Lappies around Victoria (and in Queensland and NSW) who have given herding a go! Maybe your Lappie will be the next one!

Where to start? Well, the FLCV is arranging a Herding Clinic and Fun Day, which will be held in Nyora (about 35km past the Pakenham exit on the South Gippsland Fwy) on Sunday 15 November. This clinic will be run by an experienced herding instructor, who regularly runs clinics for Vic Herding.

In the morning, the dogs will have a chance to try their paw at herding. Then we will share a BBQ lunch together. This is sure to be an absolutely fantastic day!

Numbers will be limited, so places will require booking, and be first in first served. Unfortunately, because of the number restrictions, we are going to need to keep this day to Lappies only at this stage.
